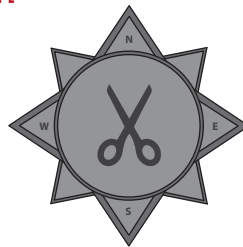


WRITE A GREETING CARD POEM

 - If you are going to rhyme, make it easy. Don’t finish a line with “orange” and then spend an hour looking for a word that will rhyme.
- There are rhyming dictionaries out there, which are helpful.
- Use metaphors and artistic imagery.
 - Understand, this is a statement coming from your heart. It may not be perfect, but it is not a cookie cutter Hallmark offering for two dollars from the supermarket.
